



PROJECT OF THE MONTH

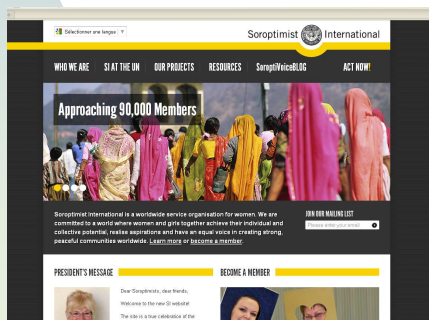
This month's winner is SI Krakow (Poland) for their project "Help for people after flood". The Programme Focus Objective of this PFR is no. 6: Mitigate the effects of climate change and integrate sustainability into personal choices and government policies and programmes.

Numerous towns, villages, homes, schools and libraries were swamped during the floods in Krakow and Katowice region. Three Polish Soroptimist clubs collected books for libraries. In the end, 10,400 books were collected and donated to seven libraries, one school and one kindergarten. Some of the books have been donated by publishing houses for the victims of the flood.

According to PFR no. 18672, the project costs amount in € 52,000 and the club members have dedicated more than 100 hours to this project. Congratulations!

Commission on the Status of Women

More than 1400 representatives of 307 Civil Society Organizations met in New York City for the 55th UN Commission on the Status of Women (CSW). The CSW is the global policy making body of the UN that is entirely devoted to monitoring the state of progress for women and girls. This year's theme was 'the access and participation of women and girls in education, training, science and technology, including for the promotion of women's equal access to full employment and decent work'. This topic is very relevant to Soroptimist work as we just have decided to focus on the long term theme 'Education and Leadership'.

28 Soroptimists presented the diversity of our international programmes in partnership with the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS). Workshops addressed a range of topics such as 'intergenerational dialogue', 'women and climate change', 'formal and informal education' and 'combating violence against women'. We also advocated with our respective Government delegations for accessible, acceptable, available and good quality education for women and girls as a lifelong process.

The highlight of the two week session was the official launch of UN Women under the able leadership of the former Chilean President and now UN Under Secretary General Michelle Bachelet. The messages delivered at the launch were: **Challenges are manifold – Bold action is essential – Results are achievable – Hopes are high – We are ready!**

The new Agency focuses on five priority areas:

- Increasing women's leadership and participation
- Ending violence against women
- Engaging women in all aspects of peace and security processes
- Enhancing women's economic empowerment
- Making gender equality central to national development planning and budgeting.

UN Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon confirmed findings by declaring 'where women are educated and empowered, economies are more productive and strong. Where women are fully represented, societies are more peaceful and stable'.

It was agreed that – in order to create sustainable change - a critical mass of women leaders need to be trained for private and public spheres. Examples of countries where women are represented equally proved the point with higher development indicators.

Even though we still have a long way to go till we achieve full gender equality, the meeting gave a lot of hope and encouragement presenting many diverse ways of strengthening women's voices

and participation in creating a better world for all of us. As Michelle Bachelet states 'women's strength, women's industry, women's wisdom are humankind's untapped resource. The challenge is to show how this resource can be effectively tapped in ways that benefit us all.'

April 7 – World Health Day

World Health Day is an occasion to reflect on the relationship between women and health. Why is it vital to provide particularly women and girls with health services and sanitation? The answer is clear: Discriminating gender norms have a negative impact on the well-being of women. Especially in the global South, women lack economic resources and are thus not able to provide themselves and their families with adequate medicine and necessary hygiene precautions.

Also, they are often subject to harmful practices as female genital mutilation; they are victims of sexual violence and suffer consequently from long-lasting psychic and physical injuries, as well as early pregnancies or sexually-transmitted diseases. As long as these gender inequalities persist, it will be difficult to achieve the various Millennium Development goals such as the combat of HIV/AIDS, Malaria and other diseases, the eradication of extreme poverty and hunger or universal primary education. Therefore, gender sensitive health policies, programmes and projects are vital to the empowerment of women. This year's World Health Day focuses on antimicrobial resistance and its global spread. For this year's World Health Day, World Health Organization will initiate a six-point policy package to fight the spread of antimicrobial resistance. This month, we feature the project **"RW0001 – Construction of water tanks to collect rainwater"**. This project is so far the most successful project on the Project Matching site. The Rwandan Union initiated this project to help the numerous women who head households in the district of Ngoma, Rwanda. They live in poverty and have limited access to safe water supply. To overcome this, the goal of the Rwandan Union's project is to supply infrastructure for rainwater collection to 20 women-headed households. This will enable girls in these families to attend school instead of walking miles to fetch water and will also protect the environment by reducing soil erosion (resulting from heavy rain seasons, poor agricultural practices and lack of rainwater harvesting). Funds already received: €5400.
Funding now needed: €5168.
