Dear Soroptimists,

Many of you will be preparing to attend the SI/E Congress, and I will be delighted to welcome you in Amsterdam. We think you will be proud of the professional quality of this Federation event. In fact, with the SI/E online branding campaign, the new website with video clips and the facelift of The Link, SI/E is making enormous strides in modernising our image. This Soroptimist year alone, we will gain 24 new clubs and 600 members in SI/E, bringing our total membership to well over 35,000. Considering this number of Soroptimists in 57 countries, it is sad that only 2% of members have chosen to participate in the Congress. After all, it is held just once every four years!

Heading towards one million euros

SI/E is currently engaged in scores of water-related and other projects to empower and transform the lives of women and children. The 'Soroptimists go for Water' theme has already inspired donations of some € 700,000 in water and sanitation projects, and we have only just begun! I am amazed by and grateful for your commitment. At the Congress the winner of the SI/E Water Best Practice Award will be announced. With so many interesting projects, it was very difficult to select the shortlist of candidates.

Violations of women's rights

SI/E is very concerned about the increasing number of violations of women's rights in recent months, most notably the proposed legislation in Afghanistan that would, among other things, legalise rape within marriage. This prompted our Board to write to the different heads of State involved and to leaders in positions of influence to prevent this law from coming into effect.

Our SI/E constitution demands strict neutrality in party politics and in conflicts between nations. However, almost all our objectives are sociopolitical – whether trafficking, water or the elimination of landmines. Our neutrality must not silence our protests

against violations of basic human rights. The very purpose of collaborating in an international organisation and acting as a 'global voice for women through Awareness, Advocacy and Action' would be undermined and our credibility questioned.

It is important to recognise and acknowledge the need to perform professionally within an organisation of women volunteers. 

In the presence of numerous heads of state, UN representatives, water experts, activists, journalists and nearly 5,000 organisations, SI/E was the voice of women at the 5th World Water Forum in Istanbul, Turkey. SI/E President Mariet Verhoef-Cohen, Turkish Union President Emine Erdem and other Soroptimists were among the 33,058 participants from 192 countries in the world's largest water event ever held. Here is the report by SI/E Programme Officer Suba Parthiban.



One of two events organised by the Turkish Union was a 'Women and Water' discussion.

The very first special session of the Forum was dedicated to 'Health, Dignity and Economic Progress: The Way Forward for Gender Equity' where the debate was dominated by water and sanitation concerns. Uschi Eid, session co-chair and member of the UN Advisory Board on Water and Sanitation, stressed how sanitation is vital to a woman's well being. Indeed, it is imperative for girls to have separate toilets in schools in

order to avoid sexual harassment and rape as well as to have their privacy. In addition, the session called for gender-disaggregated (i.e. separated according to gender) data in the water and sanitation sectors, the creation and use of gender indicators, and funding for water and sanitation. Soroptimists Create Awareness

Turkish Union President Emine Erdem welcomed the guests to the 'Women and Water'event. one of two organised by the Turkish Union. Speaking at this event, SI/E President Mariet paid special attention to water and sanitation, by presenting projects that SI/E was undertaking in Africa and elaborating to what extent SI/E was building women's capacity, promoting leadership and improving women's lives. 'Soroptimists encourage women to be the leaders in their communities,' said Mariet. 'We inspire them to take over project leadership and ownership.' Indeed, this very fact was emphasised throughout the Forum as the key to success. Efficient and equitable management of water resources is only achieved when women are involved in consultation processes, capacity building, decision making, policy making as well as in the management and implementation of water-related services. A short documentary about the Senegal Water Project, supervised by the Past SI President Sadun Katipoglu, was also shown at this event.

The passion and commitment of the Turkish Union was clearly evident in the photo exhibition 'Imagine Life Without Water' at the Kadir Has University in Istanbul. The message of this exhibition not only reached the Forum participants, but also addresses the younger generation of Turkey, since the photos will be shown at other universities in the country.

The second side event, 'The Role of Women in Irrigated Agriculture: Experiences from Turkey and Sri Lanka', was organised in partnership with the NetWwater organisation, based in Sri Lanka. Here, experts from different backgrounds discussed the role of women in irrigated agriculture.

In addition, SI Club Kyoto created maximum visibility for our organisation when, during the closing ceremony, they presented Watershed Organisation Trust, India, with the Kyoto World Water Grand Prize for its excellence in 'contributing to the Millennium Development Goals through grassroots initiatives'. Water does not divide – it connects

The concluding Ministerial Declaration of the Forum failed to recognise water as a human right. Instead, it only refers to 'access to safe drinking water and sanitation [as] a basic human need'. Interestingly, only last year the UN Human Rights Council adopted a resolution emphasising human rights obligations related to water and

sanitation. Unfortunately, the Ministerial Declaration falls short of reiterating women's right to water mentioned in the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women three decades ago. This reconfirms the lack of political will and the low priority given to water on the political agenda.

On the one hand, water education, the cooperation of NGOs with professional associations, efficient national and international partnerships, building of networks and increased state investment in water management will bring us closer to the realisation of the MDGs before 2015. On the other hand, the lack of transparency in policy making means that the conflict potential of water will increase. It is clear that women and children are the most vulnerable with a proliferation of water conflicts. More women in decision-making processes who can fight the power asymmetry will help bring water to the top of a state's political agenda. Soroptimists need to develop new strategies, policies and energise policy makers in the years to come. We do not want to start the process from scratch when we meet for the 6th World Water Forum in Durban, South Africa in 2012. Soroptimists have a duty to take the process to the next level by LEADING, SHARING and CARING.

SI/E BENEFITS FROM GRANTS

One of the key advantages of joining the Women for Water Partnership is the possibility to obtain grants and funds to further our work and to support our projects. Since becoming a member in 2007, SI/E has received numerous grants and resources for water projects in Africa, totalling nearly € 34,000.

As already reported in previous issues of The Link, Women for Water Partnership (WfWP) is a worldwide strategic alliance of local, national and international women's organisation and networks active in the areas of sustainable development, water, poverty and gender issues. Member organisations are in South America, the Caribbean, Africa, Asia and Western and Eastern Europe. The partnership consists of more than a million women from different social, cultural and professional background. Empowerment, local ownership, equity mainstreaming, partnership and grassroots development are the key concerns of WfWP.

WfWP members can apply for grants every two years. There are four different kinds of grants available:

Seed Funds (SF) are given for the development of project proposals. In this connection SI/E received a grant totalling € 5,500 for a water project proposal initiated in Mali. Club Nijemegen made the application.

A Communication Infrastructure (CI) grant is meant to help improve the communication of member organisations internally, with Women for Water Partnership, the WfWP members and the rest of the world. One of these grants was allocated to SI/E in 2009 for the development and maintenance of its 'Soroptimists go for Water' website providing information about the SI/E Water Congress.

Capacity Development (CD) grants support capacity development activities to strengthen member organisations, such as training for project management, lobby and advocacy, etc. and the transfer of capacity competences from one member

organisation to another. SI/E received a CD grant for the Dynamic Networking (formerly known as Functional Networking) training at the Governors' Meeting in 2008 (€ 7,750) and will be given a second CD grant for the Sustainable Leadership training provided at this year's Governors' Meeting.

A Exchange Visit grant allows exchanges between WfWP member organisations to develop and implement project proposals or to provide alternative solutions based on a study visit programme.

WfWP is also supporting an important Moldova network with WfWP members and

women's NGOs to work together on water and sanitation projects. Club Chisinau is involved in this network and will thus benefit from this aid as well. The WfWP and the other NGOs organised a conference in Moldova from 18th, 20th May titled 'From Policy to Practice: Developing Sustainable Water and Health Projects for Moldova' (see also www.conference.wisdom.md or www.womenforwater.org).

In addition to all these grants, WfWP has supported individual water projects initiated by SI/E in Africa, many of which have been presented in The Link. The partnership with WfW has been a great opportunity for SI/E, and both organisations have benefited from our similar goals and objectives. As the 'Soroptimists go for Water'

As the 'Soroptimists go for Water' theme will be extended through 2011 and perhaps even longer, our Federation will gladly remain a member of WfWP and urges clubs to continue supporting projects that will contribute to eradicating poverty, securing potable water and safe sanitation and promoting education.

EXPERIENCE GIFT OF FRIENDSHIP

uring the Governors' Meeting on 8th July in Amsterdam, the SI/E Board has organised a training seminar on sustainable leadership. A professional trainer will coach participants on how to lead and to accept leadership in an organisation of women volunteers.

Most of us have experienced the challenges and pitfalls of being leaders and being led in our professional lives. Especially for the highly trained and well educated, it is not easy to fit into an organisation and find the right tone in leading peers. More challenges arise when professionals are united in a volunteer organisation comprised of women of many different nationalities and cultures. Professionals have the natural tendency to think they know best what to do and how to advise others. Among themselves, professional women often have difficulties in creating a good climate for decision-making and in accepting the leadership of others. Almost every decision is subject to lengthy discussions, debates and sometimes even open conflicts. Clearly, this is not the most effective way of making decisions and moving forward. At times, we as leaders may even lack the inspiration and creativity needed to 'sell' our own ideas and arguments to others.

The purpose of the training seminar at the Governors' Meeting is to recognise and acknowledge the need for professional leadership at all levels of Soroptimist International and when Soroptimists work with other organisations, such

CHALLENGES AND PITFALLS OF LEADERSHIP

Machteld Pel has years of experience in mediating and will lead the leadership training in Amsterdam. as the Women for Water Partnership. We will investigate and map the current state of leadership, identify obstacles and pitfalls, develop a model of what professional leadership means and examine ways of introducing and accepting real leadership.

Soroptimist Machteld Pel, Director of the court-annexed mediation agency in the Netherlands and a qualified mediator and mediator trainer, will lead the training. After an introduction to leadership, co-operation and issues that can be obstacles to or can promote productive co-operation, smaller groups will discuss designated topics and practice specific skills. In the end, we hope that participants will go away with the feeling that we have made progress in creating an optimal atmosphere for co-operation in our organisation.

Study tour of Sierra Leone

to see the results of the SI project 'A Family and A Future'

After arriving safe and sound in Freeport, we embarked on a five-hour drive to Sierra Leone's second largest city, Bo. Ninety-three smiling young women welcomed us, cheerfully singing and dancing to the drums of two boys who once had been street children! It was quite moving to hear the

> girls sing how we had given them a new future, an opportunity to survive and become self-reliant.

At the centre, the girls had received vocational training in cooking, hairdressing, sewing and dyeing. Childcare was provided so that the young mothers could attend the centre for one and a half years.

We also met with a group of women who wanted to form a new Soroptimist club! Hanne Jensbo gave a talk about the organisation and encouraged them in this respect.

The next day another long journey followed to the outback village of Makeni. The project in Makeni started in 2007. Here, 40 families with a total of 126 children are now receiving support. In addition, some 150 street children are attending school and learning a trade. The centre has an administration building, a day-care centre, a health clinic and a school. The clinic assists pregnant women, treats those with malaria and provides therapy for AIDS victims. We then met another group of women who plan to form a

Day three brought us to the village of Kamakwie where we met with several families. The village head thanked the Soroptimists for their support, adding that we are helping the world to become a global village.

Our return journey to Freetown ended up quite adventurous after one of our vehicles broke down. Before departing, some participants visited the Mercy Fistula Hospital. I stayed on for a further week to meet with members of the local club.

All of us were pleased to see how our aid is bearing fruit. 'Hope and Homes for Children' is doing a wonderful job of helping those who need it most by offering them a brighter future. I would love to see more clubs support Project Sierra. Your help is highly appreciated!

Individual projects to be continued

SI EXITS PROJECT FIVE-O

At the FIVE-O Committee meetings held in New York in February, SI President Margaret Lobo announced that SI will drop out of Project FIVE-O, thus following in the footsteps of Zonta International and the International Federation of University Women. The organisations Business & Professional Women International and International Council of Women will continue with Project FIVE-O. If necessary, SI will provide transition support to the new leadership until the end of 2009. But most importantly, SI will finish the projects it started and carry forward with other projects under the SI umbrella. SI Clubs participating in local FIVE-O projects are also urged to continue with their support. In addition, SI Clubs and UN representatives are encouraged to foster collaborative partnerships with other organisations, including the former FIVE-O partners.

One of the main reasons for this decision was that the money for FIVE-O projects was almost exclusively donated by SI. Another concern was that the funds raised should only be used for projects. Any remaining money will be allocated to projects, primarily to those already existing.

It was no doubt an admirable idea when the five international women organisations decided to work together on projects in developing countries at the second World Women's Conference in Copenhagen in 1980. The resulting projects have helped to advance the status of thousands of women worldwide and to improve their lives and as well as those of their children.

EMPOWERING WOMEN FROM SLUMS

The aim of the 'Home Management Course – Life Skill Development' project, organised by FIVE-O, is to educate women from Mumbai's slum communities to become recognised professional domestic help. By learning better negotiating skills, the Indian women are empowered to succeed.

At the end of February, I took part in the event celebrating the certification of the first 43 young women to finish their education. The training included 'Housekeeping & Kitchen Management', carried out at the famous Hotel Taj Mahal; 'Child & Geriatric Care', taught at the Family Service Centre, a voluntary organisation committed to preserve, promote and strengthen the family as a unit; and 'Grooming & Personality Development', offered by the members of WGU (Women Graduate Union affiliated to the International Federation of University Women).

The young women, whose average age is 18 years, dressed in their finest for the occasion, and

some even brought their babies. All listened attentively to

the speeches stressing the accomplishments of Project FIVE-0. Some of the participants described the change in their lives. They are now more independent and have achieved a higher standing in their families. With this certificate they will be in great demand as domestic help. For all this, they are truly grateful.

After experiencing this moving event, I can once again attest to the great benefit of Project FIVE-0 and what it has meant for women in poverty and need! I personally regret the SI Board decision to exit Project Five-O, as I have always been whole-heartedly committed to the idea of five being stronger than one, especially during my term as SI Liaison Project FIVE-O.

Thanks to the professional education provided by this Project FIVE-O, the 43 young participants are far better prepared for future employment.

SI/E Water Best Practice Awards SELECTING THE SHORTLIST

At the 19th SI/E Congress in Amsterdam, the European Federation will present cash prizes honouring two exemplary water projects. The Selection Committee will choose the winner of the Water Best Practice Award 2009 (€ 10,000), and online voting will decide the Public's Project Award (€ 5,000) from the eight nominees presented below in alphabetical order by country.



Club Spittal/ Millstättersee raised the funds for the costs of constructing a well at the collective farm for orphans in Aricesti near Bucharest.

Selecting the eight nominees from all the excellent water projects was not easy. Many more were worthy of distinction, but sadly, the criteria for submitting an application were not always followed. Each potential candidate had to submit a 2-4-page report using the Criteria for the Water Best Practice Award as a guideline and including photos and drawings. The sponsor also had to prepare a poster presentation of the project for the Congress. The projects had to have been realised during the period from September 2007 to June 2009. The deadline for applications was 1st April 2009.

Club Spittal/Millstättersee in Austria

An old pump on a collective farm for orphans in Aricesti, half of whom are girls, was unable to meet its own water needs, so Club Spittal/Millstättersee decided to help by building a well/fountain and educating the young people about the importance of conserving water. Now there is enough water for drinking, sanitation and farming uses. They grow their own vegetables and have even started delivering produce to local markets.

The 'drums on wheels' financed by Club Ouagadougou allow women in Signonguin to transport water to their homes and to generate income by renting the drums.

Club Ouagadougou in Burkina Faso

Burkina Faso has a serious water problem. Club Ouagadougou came up with the idea to supply drinking water from a fountain for the inhabitants of Signonguin on the outskirts of the city. Water drums attached to wheels will allow



some of the poorest women in the area to transport sufficient quantities of water to their homes. By renting out these drums, the women can also generate an income.

Club Kumasi in Ghana

Club Kumasi constructed toilets, bathrooms and a borehole in Aveduase, thus offering decent sanitary facilities to the village inhabitants and the students from the nearby university. Employment was provided for local construction workers

and maintenance personnel. Income generated by selling the water will help pay the salaries of workers and fund other projects such as the construction of an incinerator and a day nursery where mothers can leave their children.

Club Xanthi in Greece

This comprehensive project involved informing and sensitising citizens and authorities about a wide variety of water issues. With the assistance of the Environment Coordinator of the Greek Union, Club Xanthi organised a Conference on Water. A successful PR campaign was also initiated, resulting in wide coverage in the local media.

Club Udine in Italy

In line with the Italian Union's national initiative 'Pax per aquam', Club Udine implemented a project in Mozambique, 'A well for Chica'. The main goal was to dig a well for the village of Chica with the help of Italian architectures. The project was successfully completed in December 2008, and the well now provides clean water to Chica's Health Centre as well as to the local community.

Club Mandrosa in Madagascar

The objective of this project was to build a nursery with toilets and provide a well for drinking water in the village of Ambohidehilahy, cur-

rently lacking in electricity, a school, day care and clean water. This will enable women to go to work and thus earn a living as well as improve local hygiene and health. A committee will manage the water distribution.

Turkish Union

Several clubs of the Turkish Union co-operated on the Blue Gold Water Education Project to create awareness of the importance of water among teaching trainees. The Union also sponsored an 'Imagine Life Without Water' Photo Exhibition and helped organise the Preparatory Conference for the 5th World Water Forum. The awareness-building Photo Exhibition will tour several universities. Catelogues were sold to finance the Education Project. The Turkish Union's activities at the 5th World Water Forum are mentioned in a separate article.

Club Dnepropetrovsk in the Ukraine

Club Dnepropetrovsk had a two-pronged project to install special filters at a local orphanage and to educate the young people about the importance of clean water and how to conserve it. The children learned about the water issues through fairy tales and poems and contributed pictures to an exhibition on the subject of clean water. The Club also financed biological and chemical analyses of the water.

With the support of Club Udine in Italy, a well was constructed and now provides clean water to the village of Chica in Mozambique

STILL A LONG WAY

19th Future African Federation Meeting

The First Lady, Chantal de Souza Yayi, opened the Future African Federation Meeting in Cotonou, Benin, in the presence of several Ministers and Deputies and also gave much support to the whole Congress, held from 12th-14th March. The opening ceremony, the dinner at the Consulate of Ivory Coast and the gala were of a very high standard. Everybody present enjoyed the festive atmosphere.

Unfortunately, the General Assembly itself again showed a lack of knowledge of the Constitution and the By-Laws of our organisation. The fact that participants change from one African Meeting to the next makes it difficult for the provisional Board to realise the dream of the Future African Federation. I assisted during part of the meeting and offered advice, but the training was postponed and lasted only half an hour because of lack of time. So I concentrated on the most important questions.

The very big advantage of the meeting is the contact between the many countries present: Benin, Burkina Faso, Ivory Coast, Ghana, Mali, Nigeria, Senegal and Togo. The election of three Technical Commissions - Extension, Constitution and Finance - is a step forward for the African Meeting.

The next meeting will be held in Nigeria in 2010.

Various projects in Africa

ACHIEVING MORE THROUGH CO-OPERATION

Continuing her untiring work for a variety of projects in Africa, Roswitha Ott, SI/E Project Manager Africa, provided the following report after her travels to Togo and Benin in March 2009. She witnessed how strong clubs have initiated projects to help in the development of their countries - often with the support of the Women for Water Partnership, European clubs, the Action Fund or money raised by Roswitha herself or African Soroptimists.

Club Lomé I

Club Lomé I realised two projects during the past year with the help of the Action Fund and Women for Water. One was the solar pump in Badja mentioned in the last issue of The Link, and the other impressive project is the big wall around the school, Ecole Tokoin CEBEVITO, which is now finished. The wall will help protect the very young pupils from drug dealers. I am currently looking for a sponsor to fund the work to add two doors in the wall.



This ward for premature babies now has sufficient electricity thanks to Club Lomé I.

Club Lomé I has initiated a new project to provide solar electricity for the maternity ward in Badja. Vaccinations and many other treatments are impossible without electricity. In 2008 the centre treated 575 patients and 39 babies were born. The plans for electrification and part of the money are ready. However, I must find an additional € 2,500.

Club Lomé Aurore

It is a long-term project of Lomé Aurore to help an evening school where students between seven and fifty years old learn to read and write in classes of about 40 people. The Club donated books for the students, desks for a whole schoolroom, blackboards and electric light. The salary of a teacher is EUR 15 a month. I paid the wages of seven teachers for two months to prevent the school from closing down because of lack of money.

In cooperation with Club Monthey in Switzerland, Club Lomé Aurore is supporting the maternity ward of the Tokoin hospital. Together with the Club, I visited the hospital, where its Chief Paediatrician Professor Atakoumad explained the difficult situation. The visit itself was a horrific experience. The members of Club Lomé Aurore and I were totally shocked about the condition of the maternity ward. So we are all highly motivated to offer help to the newborn babies, and above all those prematurely born. Club Lomé Aurore spontaneously decided to clean the dirty maternity. Club Monthey is helping with medical equipment, financed by selling a beautiful calendar 2009.

Club Lomé Agapé

During the last six years Club Lomé Agapé has built up the Rayon de Soleil orphan home, together with the Clubs Milano Fondatore and alla Scala. Sixteen girls have found a home and education here. Rayon de Soleil is one of the most impressive projects in Africa, and the long-term cooperation between Togo and Italy deserves all our admiration.

Financed by the Action Fund and sponsors I have organised, Edwige Lawson, Past President of Club Agapé, developed teaching materials for teachers and children to help curb the spreading of HIV. Edwige herself travels to many schools to give lessons on this subject.

Edwige is also working on a toilet project for the Ahépé-Seva school, which we visited. Another water project is planned for the small fishing village of Kouvé to purify the local water sources.

Club Kara Lila

As Kara Lila was too far away for me to visit this time, President Elise Adom came to Lomé to report. The Club built two wells, one in Agninkata in cooperation with the Spanish Clubs Marina Baixa/Costa Blanca, Val d'Aran, Madrid and Costa del Sol, and another in Agnarme with the Clubs Antwerpen-de zes Rozen, Antwerpen Anthos and Land van Waas.

Club Cotonou Doyen

The Club Cotonou Doven organised a drawing competition at the school of Adounko and handed over prizes to the ten best pupils. They have also discussed drinking water in the area and the construction of a maternity ward. Club Cotonou Doyen and its President Koubourath Osseni intend to take care of the entire village.

Through the initiative of Moubaraka Adjao, President of Club Cotonou Gazelle, a first well has been built in Dangbo with the help of sponsors from Cotonou. As Vice-President of the Chamber of Commerce, she made use of her good contacts and collected € 7900 towards this project. The well is 60 metres deep and was constructed with very limited technical means. The Club is planning two more wells. One will be partly financed by Club Lippstadt, Germany.

Protesting violations of women's rights

Three recent news items should cause growing concern among women around the world. The Taliban introduced its stricter form of Sharia law in the Swat Valley of Pakistan with severe restrictions on women and girls. A court judge in Saudi Arabia refused to annul a marriage between an 8-year-old girl and a 47-year-old man. And then the last straw: the parliament of Afghanistan passed a law on 'Personal Status' for Shia citizens which contains paragraphs clearly violating women's rights, for example, by virtually legalising rape in marriage. Although the new law is meant only for the Shia population (which in itself is contrary to the Afghanistan Constitution), it paves the way for application to all Afghan women.

SI/E President Mariet Verhoef-Cohen drew SI President Margaret Lobo's attention to these developments. Ultimately, SI made an appeal on the blog site. President Mariet wrote letters to Afghan President Hamid Karzai, UN Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon and UN High Commissioner for Human Rights Navaneetham Pillay as well as President of the European Commission José Manual Barroso, asking for assistance in stopping this law from coming into force. Christine Cromwell-Ahrens, SI/E Representative to the Council of Europe, also urged the President of the Conference of International Non-Governmental Organisations to take a stand against this new legislation. As a result, the President of the Gender Equality Transversal Group sent an open letter to President Karzai as well. We are now all waiting to see that he makes good on his publicised promise to change the law.

All these measures are not only fully acceptable according to our Constitution, but also necessary to help defend women's rights. We as Soroptimists have a duty to make ourselves heard in cases of discrimination against women and girls. No one will forget the photos of devastation and despair after the earthquake struck in Central Italy.

SOLACE AND SUPPORT IN DIRETIMES

In the early hours of April 7, 2009, an earthquake devastated the medieval city of l'Aquila and surrounding areas of Central Italy. Miriam D'Ascenzo of Club di Pescara gives us a personal account of the situation and shows how Soroptimists offer solace and support in dire times.

Words cannot describe the devastation and despair this severe earthquake left behind. It was the worst natural disaster in thirty years. Several hundred people were killed, thousands injured, about 55.000 persons lost their homes. It is hard to talk and even painful to write about it, if one is part of the tragedy itself.

The world's eyes were on l'Aquila, but the reality is much worse than shown by the media and it will stay - long after the cameras have gone. The survivors attempt to organise some kind of normal life, although there is not really a 'normality' to go back to. Deprived of their belongings and their daily routine, these people have experienced the loss of loved ones and friends, the total destruction of the ancient parts of their town, the disappearance of their past. They are experiencing panic, pain, hopelessness and despair. As a member of the l'Aquila club told me in a tearful voice: 'We are alive, but inside we are dead'.

Faced by such an atrocious void, the Soroptimist spirit has created a chain of solidarity, which has initially focused on comfort as the first form of aid for our 'sisters' and their families. The news spread all over Italy from one mobile phone to the other; it was a great comfort for the people of l'Aquila to hear friendly voices, to receive reassurance, to be given signs of hope.

Every time a new tremor is felt, our thoughts fly to our friends and to the thousands of victims in precarious situations. It is important to know

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inquish ment to that there are people who care for us and who offer such comforting and encouraging words. But now the time for words and thoughts is over. Soroptimist friends from all over Italy are coming together to set up a coordinated and effective aid strategy.

Readiness, commitment, participation and involvement are the key words of their actions, remembering that it is not only what we do that defines us, but our ability to get up and pick up the pieces after such a tragedy.

The local population voted unanimously for the reconstruction of l'Aquila, even though the earth is still quaking repeatedly many times a day. They are very conscious of the vulnerability of l'Aquila, built in the Middle Ages according to a harmonious design, which has no precedent in the history of Italian urban architecture.



THE STORY BEHIND THE SCHOLARSHIP

The Scholarship Fund, established in 1968 by SI/E, supports and promotes the professional, occupational and vocational development of professional women, Soroptimist or non-Soroptimst. For 2007/2008, the total amount spent on scholarships was € 72,000. One of the 16 recipients was Dr. Penka Petleshkova-Angelova from Bulgaria. With the grant of € 7500, she was able to expand on her research work at the San Martino Hospital in Genoa/Italy.

I work at the Department of Neonatology, at the Pazardzhik AD Hospital in Plovdiv/Bulgaria. For the implementation of my research project: 'Hearing Loss in Neonates and Infants - Rehabilitation of Deafness in Children', I visited the Audiometry Sector of the ENT Clinic at the San Martino Hospital in Genoa several times. The support of both Professor A Salami, Head of the ENT Clinic, and specialist Dr M Barbieri, was invaluable.

Dr Barbieri shared his experience in the diagnosis and treatment of hearing loss in neonates. He made it possible for me to use the equipment and perform evaluations. Moreover, I could attend operations on Cochlear implants in selected cases, which was very beneficial to me.

My colleagues in Bulgaria were excited to hear about my experience and had a lot of questions. The method of Cochlear implants is still very new in Bulgaria. It became evident that we must continuously update our knowledge in the early diagnosis and rehabilitation of hearing loss of neonates in the first six months after birth. Such a hearing loss is curable by inserting a Cochlear implant. We should also increase our expertise in order to retain children's speech capabilities.

So we came up with the idea of creating an interdisciplinary rehabilitation centre in Plovdiv. Since there are problems with rehabilitation in Bulgaria, we intend to buy the needed equipment and organise countrywide training sessions for colleagues.

During my stay in Genoa, I also visited the local SI Club. I met with acting President, Daniela Caprino, who is a paediatrician. We discussed the possibilities of a future cooperation. Back home I informed the SI sisters accordingly, and as a start, we will establish a Friendship Link between the two clubs.

In closing, I would like to express my gratitude to SI Europe for their encouragement and generous financial help. This project has enriched me not only in a professional but also personal way. My sincere thanks also go to our Italian sisters for their friendly welcome and contribution.
