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WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Soroptimists and Soroptimist supporters,

The last sentence of last year's annual report read, 'I can already predict the next annual report: an exhilarating wave of projects, inspiration, and empowerment, driven by the unwavering passion and dedication of the fiercely committed Soroptimists.' This statement set the stage for a year marked by extraordinary efforts and remarkable progress.

While last year reflected a collective eagerness to rebound after the prolonged lockdown, this year has seen an even stronger engagement among our members, to maintain the momentum of our rebuilding efforts. Embracing the 'rebuild, rethink, reinvent, and reposition' mindset, numerous innovative ideas emerged, surpassing our expectations. Each country, guided by its own cultural context, took appropriate actions, making Soroptimism a highly attractive organisation that every member and potential member aspires to join. Although membership figures are not detailed in this report, we are proud to note that we have successfully curbed the decline in membership, marking a fraction of losses seen in previous years. As President, I extend my applause to all our members across the 43 countries where we are present.

Last year's high number in projects was attributed to recovery efforts post-lockdown. This year, however, represents a clear continuum rather than a setback or a moment of rest. What we initially thought was a sprint turned out to be a marathon, and our members were more than ready to persist, replicate their efforts, and contribute even more, as this report proves.

Introducing change in a 100-year-old organisation is challenging. Yet, our members have demonstrated their reliance on the unconditional support and commitment of the board and committee members, who continuously addressed their needs and queries. They also witnessed the dedication and competence of our Headquarters, our sole professional body within Soroptimism. We are fortunate to benefit from their years of experience and expertise. With this unified talent, we created a 'safe space for change' which was my aim. I am grateful to all who joined me in my endeavours with their full commitment and dedication.

This year, we not only continued our Growth Academy for our members and enhanced our Leadership Academies with more targeted initiatives, including campaigns focused on mental health preventing domestic and digital violence, but we also responded to the many demands for repositioning our organisation. This report details the projects undertaken. Beyond action, we also focused on raising awareness and advocating, which are crucial as we navigate our identity as a non-political NGO. Many members voiced concerns about our perceived weak identity in this regard. Addressing this, we focused on the 'reposition' factor during the Programme meeting in June. Our strategic plan, objectives, and focus areas emphasise advocacy as much as projects.

The demand from our members to be better prepared and equipped with the necessary tools, knowledge, and skills to present strong arguments was justified and addressed. This acknowledgement not only recognised our identity challenge but also addressed it, serving as an eye-opener for many. It also stands as a tribute to the hard work of our representatives within our SIE umbrella organisations and the United Nations, especially amid humanitarian crisis in the Middle East, following a barbaric and strongly condemned attack where women were clearly targeted and violated. The result of this June Programme meeting, highlighting and responding to the need for our 'repositioning,' was nothing short of exponential as detailed in this report.

I am already thrilled to anticipate next year's report, as our members continually prove they not only stand up but also stand strong and determined in making our world a better place for women and girls. They are more empowered than ever to speak up. Stay tuned for more updates, and a sincere thank you to all of you for standing with us.

ABOUT SOROPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL OF EUROPE

Soroptimists educate, empower and enable women and girls to improve their lives. Soroptimist International of Europe (SIE) is a network of 30'149 professional women who work together at local, national and international levels to achieve this aim. SIE currently has 1'152 Clubs, operating across 43 countries in Europe, the Middle East, and the Caribbean. It is the largest of the five Federations making up Soroptimist International, which counts around 65'000 women as members.

Our ambition is to transform the lives and status of women and girls through education, empowerment and enabling opportunities. We want to see women and girls achieve their individual and collective potential, realise their aspirations, and have an equal voice in creating strong, peaceful communities worldwide. As Soroptimists, we strive for the advancement of women's status, high ethical standards, Human rights for all, equity development and peace through the advancement of international understanding and good will.

A part of Action and Awareness, one of the ways we achieve this is through advocacy. Soroptimist International of Europe holds general consultative status at the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) and participatory status at the Council of Europe

and the European Women's Lobby. SIE also participates in the work of OSCE through its permanent representatives. This allows SIE to advocate at the international level and lobby for the ratification and implementation of treaties concerning women. We also demand that priority issues for women receive their rightful place on the sustainable development agenda.

Our members include women of all ages, representing a wide range of professions. As such, we are a platform to share our knowledge and experience. We want to ensure that all women and girls have the opportunity to become leaders in their communities, and we will continue to lobby for them at all levels of society.

OVERVIEW 2023







EDUCATIONAL MODULE

What you can do to eliminate violence against women & girls

Kingdom of the Netherlands and Suriname

The Soroptimists of SI clubs of Isalania Zwolle and Bilt-Bilthoven, in collaboration with the Seneca Publishing Company, developed a workshop aimed at empowering young adolescents to deal with and prevent gender-based violence. This initiative, part of the United Nations' Orange the World Campaigns of 2021 and 2022, aimed to dispel taboos around violence and encourage reflection among young people. The workshop, given to approximately 800 pupils at five schools in 2021 and expanded to 3 000 pupils across 18 schools in 2022, included informative presentations, films featuring interviews with former victims, and practical assignments.

Through this initiative, the Soroptimists sought to equip individuals with tools to prevent violence, empower students to voice their thoughts, and promote dialogue among teenage girls and boys, with the goal of creating a lasting impact for generations to come.

SPECIAL AWARD 'NEW MEMBERS & VISIBILITY'

WOMEN IN STEM! The NERD project Union of Italy

In October 2021, the 'WOMEN IN STEM!' initiative, launched in cooperation with IBM, engaged 27 universities, 28 Soroptimist Italian Clubs, and 15 127 female students participating in STEM courses.

Its primary aim was to raise awareness among young women of their potential in STEM fields, focusing on education and empowerment. Through plenary sessions, workshops, and a three-day digital world workshop organized by IBM, female students were encouraged to pursue STEM careers. In the 2021-2022 academic year, 25 sessions were conducted across 25 Italian universities, and in the 2022-2023 academic year, the project expanded to include 27 universities.

In May 2023, an awards event honored the top 36 projects developed by students, aligning with the United Nations' 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, with IBM Italia's Chairman and CEO, Stefano Rebattoni, and SI Italy's President, Giovanna Guercio, in attendance.



UNION BEST PROJECT AWARD

SI Poland War Zone Initiative - Project Matching

Union of Poland





When war broke out in Ukraine in February 2022, Poland became the country with the largest number of Ukrainian refugees, with over 200 000 people entering the country on the first day alone.

Polish Soroptimist Clubs immediately initiated emergency aid initiatives along the Poland-Ukraine border, focusing on assisting women and children who needed food, clothes, medical attention, legal assistance, and a safe place to rest. Soroptimists in Poland welcomed Ukrainian families into their homes, delivered meals, and organized collections of essential items.

To meet the growing needs and raise more funds, they promoted their actions through the SIE Project Matching platform, which became an essential source of funding. Through Project Matching and other fundraising efforts, over 170 000 € was collected, reaching 23 000 Ukrainian women and children with aid, including psychological support, social integration assistance, and family holiday trips to provide a break for those affected by the conflict.

EDUCATION

BeOn-Mindful online in social media

Club of Ellwangen/Jagst (Germany)



The digital world presents both opportunities and risks for children and adolescents, impacting their psychological development and posing challenges for adults and parents in the digital age.

In response, the Soroptimists of Ellwangen developed the BeOn - Mindful Online project, aiming to promote reflection on media consumption and foster a healthy approach to social media. Through workshops, videos for parents, peer-to-peer frameworks, and informational events, BeOn addresses online violence, hate speech, cyberbullying, and self-presentation.

Implemented across six secondary schools in Ellwangen, with approximately 1 500 students participating, BeOn will run for a minimum of four academic years, supported by the city of Ellwangen and funding from SI Ellwangen, donors, and sponsors.

WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT





Standing up for women in times of crisis Enhancing women's entrepreneurial skills Club of Zagreb Centre (Croatia)

Members of SI Zagreb Centre collaborated with the Association of Female Entrepreneurs of Banovina to support female entrepreneurs in the area who chose to stay and rebuild their lives. They conducted a series of tailor-made workshops aimed at boosting essential skills for 13 female entrepreneurs from diverse backgrounds.

These workshops covered topics such as project development, stress management, motivation, personal branding, work-life balance, marketing tools, and social media. Through these workshops, participants developed a tourist and catering project, complete with a logo and website to showcase their products and services in the Sisak-Moslavina region. The project culminated in a final meeting where the website was unveiled, accompanied by a round table discussion on the challenges and opportunities for female entrepreneurs in the Banovina area. The project received media coverage, including a feature on Nova TV.

ELIMINATION OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN



Przemocometr® (Violence Metre) - Let's fight violence together Club of Wroclaw (Poland)

The project led by SI Wroclaw and Plakaciary aimed to raise awareness of violence against women (VAW) in its various forms and provide individuals with tools to address it.

Central to the project was the development of the Przemocometr®, a 'violence metre' designed to assess the nature of relationships and identify signs of abuse. Through training, lectures, and the development of materials, the Soroptimists promoted the Przemocometr® and facilitated its integration into nationwide discussions on VAW.

The project, supported by experts and prominent figures, gained significant media coverage and increased awareness and knowledge about domestic violence while providing access to information on aid institutions. Additionally, it equipped specialists with a practical tool, expanded Soroptimists' visibility in Poland, and enhanced Club members' competencies through specialised training.

HEALTH & FOOD SECURITY



Getting to know endometriosis

Club of Karsiyaka/Izmir (Türkiye)

Endometriosis, a prevalent gynecological condition affecting approximately 10% of women worldwide, often goes undiagnosed or is taboo due to lack of awareness.

The Soroptimists of SI club Karsiyaka/Izmir, recognising the need for action, collaborated with medical professionals to establish the Endometriosis and Adenomyosis Association and organised various awareness events. Their efforts included 'ENDO-MART', a march accompanied by educational campaigns and conferences, revealing alarming numbers of young girls exhibiting symptoms of the disease.

The ENDO-MART march served as a forum for information sharing, exchanges, and meetings, which were covered extensively by newspapers and media outlets. The work of the Turkish Soroptimists will continue with the aim to reach larger audiences.

SUSTAINABILITY



'Ageing with dignity' and 'time donation' Club of Trier (Germany)

The Soroptimists of SI Trier initiated the 'Ageing with dignity' project to support senior women living in nursing homes, aiming to address the gender pension gap and combat feelings of isolation and abandonment among elderly women.

The project offers monthly allowances of 100-120 € for wellness treatments such as pedicures, hairdresser visits, and purchases of cosmetics and body care products. In addition to fundraising efforts that successfully raised 18000 € for five nursing homes in the city, the Soroptimists launched a 'Time donation' project, where female students from local high schools visited residents of retirement homes to foster intergenerational encounters, maintain social ties, and combat loneliness.

The project's resounding success led the Soroptimists to continue it throughout 2023.



Action Fund

supports humanitarian projects and promotes educational programmes. The Federation awarded 80 848 € in grants.

Disaster Recovery Fund

targets the specific needs of women and girls recovering from the effects of natural disasters and armed conflicts. In 2023, the Disaster Recovery Fund remained extremely active with donations to continue targeted relief efforts. Overall, 269 015 € in grants were disbursed in earthquake relief aid for Türkiye and the Women in War Zones Initiatives.

Scholarship Fund

The Federation awards grants totaling in excess of 80 000 € per year to young women covering needs such as university fees, vocational training, and general support during studies. In memory of our founding President, the Dr Suzanne Noel Scholarship Fund provides financial assistance to female doctors to perfect their knowledge of, and experience in, plastic and reconstructive surgery.





DEVELOPING OUR DNA IN SCHOLARSHIP, LEADERSHIP, AND MENTORING

OUR COMMITTMENT

Our commitment to Scholarship, Leadership, and Mentoring contributes to the core of our organisational DNA, epitomised by our motto 'We Stand Up for Women'. We recognise education as the cornerstone of empowerment and progress for women and girls across diverse cultures. Our strategic approach follows the path of Educate - Empower - Enable.

MISSION & GOAL

During this biennium, our mission was pursued through five distinct goals. Education, as one of these goals, comprises three key components: Scholarships, Leadership Academy and Mentoring.

SIE SCHOLARSHIP FUND

We provided scholarships to 23 female students, totaling 83 700 € in grant funding, enabling career development and advancement.

SIE SCHOLARSHIP FOR REFUGEES: This unique scholarship grant, designed to facilitate the integration of refugee women in host countries fostering financial independence, benefited 38 grantees. A total grant amount of 24 500 € was allocated for short-term vocational courses, education, or training to acquire new skills or to continue education in their chosen professions.

After awarding the scholarships, we continued to engage with grantees through online meetings, further fostering mentorship and participation in SIE Leadership Academies.

SIE LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

Partially funded by the Federation, two Soroptimist Leadership Academies (SIE LA) were hosted by Bulgaria and Italy. These Academies, both aligned with SIE Leadership Academy guidelines, equipped numerous women and girls with leadership skills, complemented by mentoring programmes.

SIE MENTORING

Following the Leadership Academy in France, the focus of mentoring shifted. We introduced new mentoring programmes for SIE Leadership Academy participants from Bulgaria. New guidelines were established to integrate mentoring with every scholarship grantee and Leadership Academy participant.

Our efforts in the biennium 2021-2023 have solidified our commitment to empowering women through education, leadership, and mentoring. By supporting scholarships, organising Leadership Academies, and fostering mentorship, we continue to stand up for women, ensuring they have the resources and support needed to thrive and lead in their respective fields.

TRANSFORMING SOROPTIMISM INTO A SPRINGBOARD FOR THE FUTURE

Soroptimism is built on work carried out in clubs to improve the lives of women and girls. This legacy is a strength that many women's organisations don't have, but strive for. As Carolien Demey phrased it, transforming this solid foundation into a 'springboard for a new future', is what Programme, which embraces both project and advocacy, is all about.

Derived from the Greek pro gramma, meaning public announcement, Programme serves as a platform to articulate our objectives and actions, amplifying our impact. In 2023, we fortified our efforts by developing the Project Focus Reports (PFRs) through training sessions and webinars, making them a means of telling our story. This approach not only enriches our understanding of our work but also invites others to join our cause.

Our motto 'We Stand Up for Women' sends a strong message. It contains our determination and achievements, illustrating the countless hours spent by dedicated women striving to improve the lives of other women and society as a whole. Notably, our initiatives such as the SIE Leadership Academies (in Bulgaria and Italy) and scholarships underscore our dedication to education, while our efforts to support women in war zones in Ukraine and refugees, exemplify our movement's efficacy in responding swiftly and concretely to pressing challenges. CHAMPIONING CHANGE THROUGH INNOVATIVE CAMPAIGNS

In 2023, Soroptimist International of Europe (SIE) continued to make significant strides in advocating for gender equality and raising awareness about domestic violence through two groundbreaking campaigns that resonated across Europe. These initiatives, 'Walk in Different Shoes' and 'READ THE SIGNS', not only captivated the public's attention but also garnered the support of UN Women, showcasing the impactful work SIE is doing on the continent.

Walk in Different Shoes: a Step Towards Gender Equality

On March 8th, International Women's Day, SIE launched the 'Walk in Different Shoes' campaign, a creative and symbolic call to action for gender equality. The campaign encouraged members to literally walk in different shoes, filming themselves wearing two different types of footwear. This innovative approach served as a metaphor for the need to appreciate and understand diverse perspectives and the challenges women face daily due to gender inequality.

SIE provided all the necessary visuals and materials for the campaign, ensuring a cohesive and powerful message was conveyed across multiple countries. The creativity displayed by the members in their submissions was not only inspiring but also sparked conversations about gender equality in communities, workplaces, and online platforms. The campaign's success was a testament to the collective power of creativity and advocacy in pushing for societal change.





READ THE SIGNS: Adressing Toxic Relationships and Mental Health

Building on the momentum of the previous year, the 'READ THE SIGNS' campaign, initially launched to highlight the indicators of toxic relationships and prevent domestic violence, was expanded in 2023 to include a crucial component: Mental Health. Recognising the profound impact that abusive relationships can have on mental well-being, SIE added educational materials on mental health care and support, alongside the original seven signs of a toxic relationship.

The campaign, which coincided with the Orange Days aimed at eliminating violence against women, provided invaluable resources and guidance for recognising the early signs of abuse and the importance of mental health. The addition of mental health education to the campaign underscored SIE's holistic approach to addressing domestic violence, acknowledging the multifaceted nature of abuse and its repercussions.









UN Women Geneva's Support: a Milestone Achievement

The success and innovative approach of both campaigns did not go unnoticed. In a significant endorsement of SIE's efforts, UN Women Geneva decided to support the 'Walk in Different Shoes' and 'READ THE SIGNS' campaigns. This collaboration highlights the importance of these initiatives and their alignment with global efforts to combat gender inequality and domestic violence. The journey towards equality and safety for all is long, but with initiatives like these, Soroptimist International of Europe is leading the way, one campaign at a time.
